Conservation Updates & News

Livestock VS Predators

In August of 2009 BC's Ministry of Agriculture and Lands & the Ministry of Environment provided \$1.55 million in funding over 3 years for the BC Wild Predator Loss Prevention Mitigation Pilot Program. The Program is administered by the BC Agriculture Research and Development Corporation (ARDCorp).

The goals of the program are to:

- Develop prevention measures
- Investigation & verification of predator harassment, injuries, or killing of livestock
- Implementation of targeted predator control strategies

There is also some effort to place a level of responsibility on the producer, as the wildlife specialists may refuse payment for a verified kill if they feel there are poor husbandry practices occurring. Last year the Program paid out approximately \$50,000 in compensation to landowners for verified depredation events and \$57,000 in contracted wildlife specialists.

Many groups including the Cattlemen's Association feel that the education of husbandry practices is one of the best methods of living with predator. Kyle Lay, a wildlife control specialist of Williams Lake, says "One of the most valuable lessons learned is that simply killing wolves for being wolves doesn't stop livestock losses. In contrast removing only the offending predator has proven effective and that if you can keep a group of non-problem wolves in a territory, they will be the best gate keepers a ranch can have, better than any guard dog or gun".

Unfortunately the Wild Predator Loss Prevention Mitigation Pilot Program has an end date of December 2011 leaving the province with no predator loss program in place. This program has been quite successful, and we are hoping that the government will continue to support livestock producers by providing compensation of losses, and creating education programs.

Rehabilitation of Predators Prohibited

Update from Alberta Wildlife Rehabilitation

Alberta's Sustainable Resource Development (SRD) had issued a notice of regulations titled Schedule A in June of 2010 to Wildlife Rehabilitation Societies across Prairie Provinces and the northern region that basically stated that they could no longer rehab a long list of wildlife and that upon arrival of these species they were to be killed. This list included endangered species and migratory birds, of which other Canadian laws prohibited the killing of. This contradiction to existing Acts and obvious ethical compromise resulted in the outrage of people who became aware of the policy and after a year of letters, phone calls and complaints the government changed the policy.

The new regulations prohibit the rehabilitation of wolves, cougars, black bears and coyotes. An apparent hate for predators maybe? The reasoning may be due to the unwanted habituation of these animals. But scientific evidence supports repeatedly that they can be rehabilitated without habituating them. Governments from other countries support the rehabilitation of bears for example. Wolves are a species unlikely to end up at a rehabilitation facility, this is due to the strong family bonds where orphaned pups will be raised by other members of the pack and injured animals will also be taken care of by their family unit. But still, this regulation is just another example of our policy makers displaying their lack of value for predators our keystone species.

Since the fuss that was displayed by the public in reaction to the 2010 regulations, changed the policies; possibly by raising a fuss we can change the current ones too! Help us out and let your voice be heard.

UPDATE: BC's New Wolf Hunting Regulations

As of June 15, 2011 BC Fish and Wildlife has opened hunting season on wolves in the Caribou Region (Region 5). There is now **No Closed Season** and **No Bag Limit** for wolf hunting in the Management Units of 5-1 to 5-6 and 5-12 to 5-15. The changes will also allow for the year round trapping of wolves in Management Unit 5-1 to 5-6 and 5-12 to 5-14 with restrictions to leg-hold traps only from April 1 – Oct 14.

Wolf hunting regulations in our neck of the woods, Region 4 the Kootenays, remains the same. There is no bag limit between Sept 1 – June 15 in 16 Management Units, and no closed season on wolf hunting below 1100m in 17 Management Units.

Wolf Awareness Week

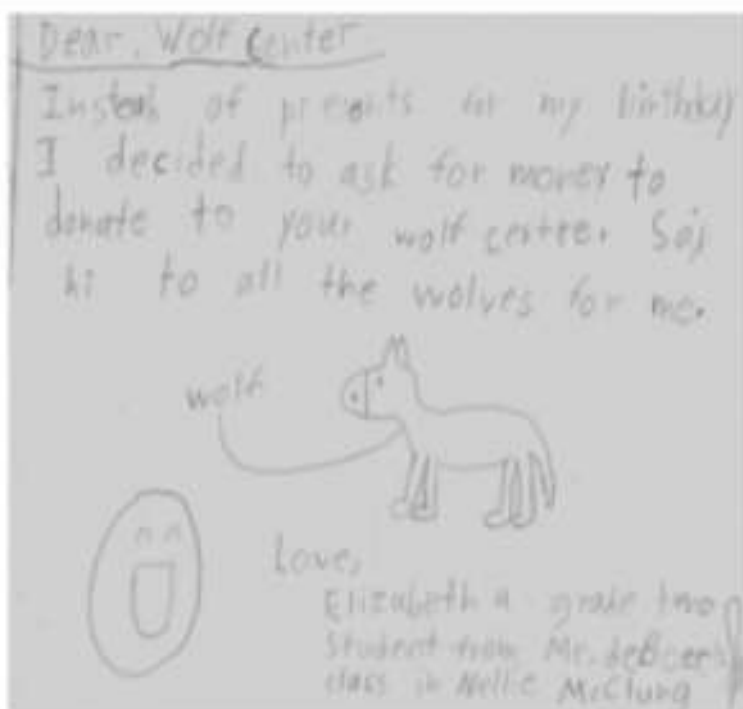


October 16th to 22nd
